

DRAWING FROM THE WORLD AROUND YOU with Aijung Kim

Note: If you do not want to spend much money on materials, please use what you have and don't feel like you need to get fancy. Most of these materials may already be available to you, but I recommend shopping at Plaza Art for additional materials:

I will be giving optional "homework" assignments for those who want a little more practice outside of our online Zoom class time. If you do not have time outside of class, don't worry about it.

MATERIALS:

- For our first class, we will be drawing from objects you have in your home (or outside, if you prefer). You may want to gather an assortment of objects to draw and have them near you.

- A sketchbook OR sheets of paper to draw on. You may use any size sketchbook that you like, but I recommend a larger sketchbook if you want more space to draw on. Use what is comfortable for you. We will be using some ink or paint in some sketchbook pages, so it's best to choose pages that are slightly thicker or are meant to withstand wet media (but really, use whatever you are comfortable with!) You may also choose to use whatever paper you have on hand for our first class and wait to purchase a sketchbook afterwards. If using sheets of paper, you also need a backing support like a drawing board or non-bending cardboard.

- Drawing pen - Micron, pilot pen, or Papermate Flair pen recommended, but anything will do.

- Pencil. It can just be a regular writing pencil or you can purchase an assortment of pencil grades if you like. It's up to you whether you think you want to experiment more with different kinds of pencils. Otherwise, one basic pencil will be fine.

- Small jar of India Ink OR watercolors. We won't be working with color as much in this class (though feel free to if you like!) so it doesn't matter what color you use. Black ink will be fine unless you want to experiment more with color.

- Cardstock or thin cardboard, cut into 4 long rectangles (recommended to cut into 1" x 8" strips, but any similar proportions will do)

- Masking or scotch tape
