Painting from the Subject: Still Life & The Figure in Oil

Instructor: David Tanner

Materials List

(Please print this out and bring to class for further recommendations.)

We'll talk about materials & the reasons behind my suggestions during the first class, but do try to have the materials *before* our first class!

CANVASES

You'll need **one canvas panel** per class each day or night we meet for weekly classes or workshops. One exercise/one canvas per class session will result in a "finished study" in oil, but if you are quick, I strongly suggest having an extra canvas handy even if you just keep it in your car.

- 12x16, 14x18, or 16x20 are my recommended sizes.
- Stretched canvas is fine too, although more expensive.

BRUSHES

We will use filberts & flats (these describe brush shape) made from **bristle** and **synthetic** with long handles. Plaza's house brand, Windsor & Newton, Robert Simmons, Silver Grand Prix, Grumbacher, Rosemary are examples of good and reasonably priced brushes. Try to get one of each:

All long handled:

- Bristle FILBERTS Size 4, 6, 8, and 10
- Synthetic FILBERTS Size 6 & 8
- Bristle FLATS Size 6 & 8
- Synthetic FLATS Size 6 & 8
- Synthetic Fan Brush Size 8

Also, have one **metal palette knife**: RGM Painting Knife #40 or #41

PAINT THINNERS/MEDIUMS

- Gamblin Odorless Mineral Spirits (OMS) 16 oz. will be our thinner/solvent. Turpenoid is fine too, in the blue & white container.
- **Gamblin Galkyd Lite** 2 fl. oz. is a suggested oil painting medium, as you will notice it increases drying time during a short painting session.

Turpentine or mineral spirits found in hardware stores are not allowed in the classroom!

OIL PAINT

I recommend tubes approximate 37 ml. and you'll need one tube of each color. **Gamblin** is my recommended brand. Their more economical yet dependable "**Gamblin 1980**" oil is absolutely fine.

(If you already own these colors in other brands, you do **not** need to buy replacements. Your existing tube in another brand is probably fine. We can determine that in class).

- Transparent Oxide Red (versatile substitute for Burnt Sienna)
- Indian Red
- Alizarin Crimson
- Quinacridone Red (aka Permanent Rose)
- Cadmium Red Light (not "Medium")
- Cadmium Orange
- Indian Yellow
- Yellow Ochre
- Cadmium Yellow Light
- Sap Green
- Thalo Green (if not Gamblin, make sure tube indicates a blue/green shade, not yellow/green)
- Cerulean Blue Hue (I like this better than regular cerulean blue, this is stronger)
- Ultramarine Blue
- Quinacridone Violet
- Ivory Black
- Titanium White (if available, get larger size 150 ml. tube for this white)

Again, if you already own some of these colors in high quality brands like Winsor & Newton/Winton, Utrecht, Williamsburg, and Old Holland etc., that's fine. Bring 'em.

PALETTE

- Masterson Palette Seal (a blue-lidded palette box) 12"x16".
- Glass palette to drop inside of box, 12"x16" (Plaza will cut & safely border this with duct tape for you) and a 12x16 piece of gray illustration or mat board for underneath the glass.
- Also, have a razor blade paint-scraper to clean glass of unusable paint residue.

HOLDER FOR MEDIUMS

Please get the **AA Double Plastic Palette Cups**, or even Masterson's Solvent Cups (lidded plastic in economical ten-packs). One cup is used for medium and the other for thinner.

TONING THE CANVAS

Please have a tube of "Golden Acrylic #6 Neutral Gray" acrylic paint. We will use acrylic for toning due to the speed of drying, and we'll tone a canvas during the first day of class. Alternatives—Plaza Acrylic Neutral Gray #1553, or Liquitex Basics Neutral Gray #5.

TONING BRUSH

"Economy 1 & 1/2 inch Gesso Brush" for the toning. Or, just a plain old hardware store 2-inch brush in fine.

PAPER TOWELS

Please have a roll of **Viva Paper Towels** to use as paint rags. You'll need to go to a supermarket or Target for these. Honest to god, they are the best paper to towels in history (at least for using as paint rags).

DIGITAL CAMERA

Please bring a digital camera to photograph demonstrations, still-life set ups, or model (with permission of model) if you run out of time and would like a record of a classroom set-up. Please have a basic understanding of how to use your camera...like how to turn the flash off.

SMALL SKETCHPAD or NOTEBOOK

Please provide a **sketch-pad of 5.5 x 8.5** so I can draw a design explanation in the form of a small sketch you can keep when we talk individually in class. Also, you can use it for preparatory thumbnails before painting or taking notes when I demonstrate.

Bring a **pencil and eraser!** A plain old #2 pencil is fine.

MISCELLANEOUS

An empty **pizza box is a good way to transport a wet canvas** home without dirtying your hands or car interior.

Suggested Reading: If you don't already, read The Artist Magazine, Plein-Air Magazine, and Fine Art Connoisseur. These publications feature articles on both contemporary and historical painters working in the representational traditions we will be studying in class.
